About the Program

A psychology major is an asset - whether your career goal is to become a clinical psychologist, counselor, social worker, or consultant; to conduct behavioral research; to become a college professor; or to enter professions such as business, law or medicine. Your expanded knowledge of human thought, emotion, and behavior is relevant to any career.

Develop the intellectual skills to help you generate and evaluate knowledge in many areas by learning and applying psychology research methodologies. Although not required for completion of the program, opportunities are available to gain experience in the field and earn credit through an internship placement that pairs you with a working professional in the field.

Why study Psychology at TU in Northeastern Maryland?

- Class sizes are small, so students experience individualized attention from faculty.

Kerri A. Goodwin (she/her), Ph.D., Professor, Chair of Psychology Department, Interim TUNE Program Coordinator.

Dr. Goodwin is a cognitive psychologist who conducts research in areas related to memory and cognition. She received her Master's degree in Experimental Psychology from SUNY-Cortland and her Ph.D degree from Florida State University.

Mark Nolder, Ph.D., Adjunct Professor Dr. Nolder works as a Counseling Psychologist for the Veterans Health Administration (VHA) at the outpatient clinic in Fort Howard, MD and specializes in the Mental/Behavioral Health field. Dr. Nolder teaches both Personality and Psychotherapy at TU in Northeastern Maryland and has been teaching at Towson University since 1993. He received his Ph.D. degree from Texas Tech University.

Jose Rosado, LCPC, NCC, MBA, Adjunct Professor Jose is a person in long-term recovery and a BiPOC clinician who works with adults, young adults, couples, as well as families. He runs a small private practice, *Grey Matter Counseling & Consulting*, based out of Harford County. In addition to his clinical background, Jose is also a MABPCB Registered Peer Supervisor (RPS) & Peer Recovery Specialist (PRS). Jose received his Master's in Clinical Mental Health Counseling from Northwestern University and received his Bachelor's & MBA from Iona University in New York ('06,'08). He graduated from the University of Alabama with a Ph.D. in school psychology and an Ed.S. in educational psychology-school psychology. He also earned M.S. degrees in rehabilitation counseling, substance abuse counseling, and vocational evaluation from East Carolina University. Before his faculty appointment at TU, Dr. Rush was a faculty member at The University of Alabama and Barry University. Before working in academe, Dr. Rush worked in public rehabilitation agencies in North Carolina and Nevada. He is a Nationally Certified School Psychologist, a Licensed Applied Psychologist in Virginia, and certified in school psychology in Maryland. Collectively, Dr. Rush has worked in rural mental health and school psychology in six states. His research interests are broadly focused on rural disparities. Dr. Rush also works in private practice.

- All programs are Maryland Higher Education Commission (MHEC) approved and, if applicable, accredited by their specific professional organization.

- Students receive a bachelor's degree awarded by Towson University. The programs at TUNE are identical to those on main campus.

Save Money.

- Fulltime TUNE students save more than \$1,500 per year on fees as compared to students on the main campus. Tuition amounts are the same at both locations.
- Parking is free and convenient.
- TUNE students save on room and board, which costs approximately \$11,000 per academic year on the main campus.

- Please read the application instructions carefully. Allow yourself approximately 20-30 minutes to fully complete the application. A \$50 non-deferrable, non-refundable fee is required with your application. Payment may be made with a credit card or electronic check.

The Deadlines

The final application deadline is **June 1 for fall admission**. The application will remain open on a space-available basis.

To be considered for merit-based scholarships offered through the University, your TU application and official transcripts **must** be submitted by March 1.
