



## ADMINISTRATIVE DEPARTMENT

### RECREATION CENTER, DEPARTMENT OF STUDENT HEALTH & WELLBEING, DIVISION OF STUDENT AFFAIRS

Katie White, associate director, programming & assessment, and Grady Sheffield, director, implemented a quiet workout space reservation system in Campus Recreation to be inclusive for the TU neurodivergent community. This reservation system promotes inclusivity by offering a quieter, more focused environment for students who may find it difficult to work out in crowded, noisy spaces. By limiting the number of participants to just six at a time, the studio ensures that individuals with varying fitness levels can engage in exercise without feeling overwhelmed or self-conscious. By offering access to essential fitness equipment like core and medicine balls, light dumbbells, mats and aerobic steps, the studio provides the necessary accessibility that benefits students who experience sensory sensitivities or anxiety. This offers them with the opportunity to enjoy their workout in a calm, less stimulating environment. Additionally, the inclusive setup encourages students of all fitness levels to engage in exercise, regardless of their experience or ability. The ability to reserve the space during peak hours, when the facility is typically crowded, helps reduce barriers to exercise that might otherwise discourage students from working out. For students managing stress, anxiety or mental health concerns, this provides opportunity to help improve their physical health and mental well-being, fostering a greater sense of balance and resilience in their academic and personal lives. The Recreation Center is a part of the Department of Student Health and Well-Being, led by Nora Giles-Clark, Ph.D., assistant vice president.

## STAFF

### **ERIN WILSON, UNIVERSITY BUDGET OFFICE, DIVISION OF ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE**

Through initiatives such as the A&F Coffee Chat series featuring R.A.C.E. (Racial Awareness Conversations for Everyone) cards, the A&F DEI Pledge, the development of a pulse survey and the implementation of shared collaborative platforms, Erin Wilson has worked intentionally to foster a campus climate that prioritizes belonging, visibility and education. The A&F Coffee Chat series, attended by approximately 240 participants, was developed in partnership with the OIIE and utilized the R.A.C.E. cards created by Dana E. Crawford, Ph.D. This initiative brought together leadership and support staff to engage in meaningful conversations on race and equity, bridging hierarchical and departmental gaps. By customizing materials, structuring seating arrangements to promote diverse perspectives and facilitating critical dialogues, this program created a welcoming space that moved the needle in fostering an inclusive and collaborative climate.

Additionally, Wilson authored the A&F DEI Pledge, embedding diversity and inclusiveness into the structural fabric of the division by institutionalizing a shared vision for equity and belonging and developed an annual pulse survey in collaboration with the Office of Assessment and OTS Change Management agents to measure key performance indicators such as engagement, satisfaction and inclusivity. This survey tracks progress and provides actionable data to guide strategic improvements, ensuring sustained efforts toward a bias-free, supportive campus environment. Together, these initiatives demonstrate innovation and impact by embedding inclusion into operational structures, fostering equality of opportunity and building tools that exceed routine expectations while advancing Towson University's mission of inclusive excellence.

# DIVERSITY & INCLUSION AWARDS

## ACADEMIC DEPARTMENT

### DEPARTMENT OF LANGUAGES, LITERATURES & CULTURES (LLC), COLLEGE OF LIBERAL ARTS

There is nothing more humbling than the encounter with difference that comes with learning a new language. In fact, that encounter with the unknown is perhaps one of the most valuable lessons that any of us can learn: the struggle to communicate with another person that is enhanced by working through a different language to reach understanding and communication. As the TU population of Hispanic- and French-speaking diasporic population grows, they have found a home in the classes offered by LLC, particularly in the Heritage Speakers initiatives that help native speakers of Spanish frame their skills for professional life after college. In fall 2024 alone, the department offered a notable number of events that foregrounded diversity and inclusion. The semester began with a standing-room only presentation by two well-known theater directors—one Israeli, the other Spanish—exploring the question of theater and democracy. One week later, the deaf studies faculty hosted a symposium that brought together deaf faculty and students from across the region, in recognition of National Deaf Awareness Week. Later in the same week, the LLC department offered a series of Spanish-language films in recognition of Hispanic Heritage Month. Now an annual tradition, this year's series focused on ideas of home, immigration and integration. The films were a kickoff to a series of events called World Wednesdays that ran throughout October and November. Each Wednesday's event featured different aspects of diverse cultures, including Japanese, Russian and Chinese calligraphy to non-verbal communication to a Jewish klezmer performance and a Brazilian folk dance lesson, to name just a few of the events that engaged students from across cultures and across the university. Amid these events, the department teamed up with the Center for Student Diversity to cohost a Dia de Muertos celebration, including a parade that proceeded from Freedom Square to a ceremonial presentation in the Liberal Arts Building. The myriad events that happened just in fall 2024 provide an apt illustration of the ongoing energy and commitment to diversity and inclusion on the part of the faculty of the Department of Languages, Literatures & Cultures.

## FACULTY

### HODA HARATI, PH.D., DEPARTMENT OF LEARNING TECHNOLOGIES, DESIGN & SCHOOL LIBRARY MEDIA, COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

One of Hoda Harati's primary contributions is the development and implementation of three interactive DEI simulations hosted on the SchoolSims platform. These simulations address critical and timely topics, including banned books, LGBTQ student support and the hijab in school settings. Designed with real actors and actresses portraying scenarios, the simulations provide an authentic and emotionally engaging experience. This realistic approach allows teacher candidates to navigate complex, sensitive issues in a controlled environment, where they can make decisions, reflect on their actions and learn from outcomes—without affecting real students. To date, these simulations have engaged more than 100 student teachers and practicing educators. They have been offered for free, ensuring accessibility to participants from diverse backgrounds. More than half of the participants voluntarily joined Harati's accompanying research study, which explores the effectiveness of these simulations in fostering cultural competence and inclusive teaching practices. Unlike traditional DEI workshops or lectures, the simulations immerse participants in real-world scenarios, encouraging deep reflection and meaningful behavioral change. By addressing systemic inequities in education and preparing educators to handle sensitive issues with empathy and cultural awareness, these simulations align closely with Towson University's mission to promote inclusive excellence.

These simulations are also being implemented for novice teachers in Maryland schools, marking a significant step toward equipping early-career educators with the skills needed to address DEI challenges. Plans are also in motion to expand their use to schools outside Maryland, reflecting the simulations' scalability and potential for broader systemic impact. By addressing critical DEI topics in education, these tools empower future educators to create equitable and inclusive classroom environments. The measurable outcomes of these initiatives include increased cultural competence, improved decision-making in challenging situations and enhanced awareness of DEI issues among participants. Interest from other institutions further highlights the simulations' potential to influence DEI practices beyond Towson University.

These simulations are also a cornerstone of her research, which examines how immersive experiential learning tools impact the development of cultural competence and inclusive teaching practices among educators. Harati also serves as a DEI liaison on the College of Education DEI Committee, collaborating with colleagues to create materials, surveys and podcasts. Harati is passionate about creating immersive, safe environments that empower future educators to address challenging DEI issues in their classrooms.

My desk was in a corner near a leaky window and a clanking radiator. My goal was to exceed more than three years at Towson, the average length of my previous two careers.



Adjustment to my new job, environment and responsibilities ran rather smoothly until the first real student crisis presented itself. A sport management intern called me late one winter morning in a panic. He had been interning with the Baltimore Colts football team, which had packed up and spirited out of town in the middle of the night! He was left without an internship and incomplete hours—not to mention that his site supervisor also was unemployed!

Fortunately, quick thinking, cool heads and resourcefulness (and good connections from the supervisor) prevailed and resolved the problem, but the situation certainly provided me with a memorable experience to share with sports fan friends and present in how-to internship coordinator workshops!

A highlight of my early years includes the first time that the program enrolled more than 500 students in internship courses for the entire year. What a milestone. We used to post internship opportunities on bulletin boards and later in notebooks that had to be updated as each internship was offered or filled. In my final year at TU, internship enrollments neared 7,500, and the Career Center posted more than 8,000 opportunities in Handshake, its online database.

For 40 years it was my honor to touch the lives of students: to teach, to provide resources, to see light bulbs turn on, to help them discover and express their strengths. It was even more of an honor to continue to learn about myself and grow as a person, a teacher, a supervisor, a leader, a professional. My roles have included staff, student, faculty, supervisor, TU parent, alumna and volunteer. I literally have felt the growth and transformations of the campus and institution itself during these past 40 years and feel that each phase has impacted my life in many ways. Now, as TU is poised for its next major step forward toward R2 status, I am ready to step into my next role or give-back phase of relationship with this institution that has been such a significant part of my life.

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
## MARK CLARK
